SIPD receives \$10,000 check from the Trilogy La Quinta Service Organization

On January 24, 2025, SIPD members Donna Williams (left in photo) and Susan Browne Rosenberg (right in photo) were presented a donation check for \$10,000 from Elaine Sena Brown (center), President of the Triloqu La Quinta Service Organization.

Donna and Susan are residents of Trilogy and submitted an application for this grant nearly one year ago. This is the largest grant check and the last of several smaller donations over the years that started when Doris Churry lived at Trilogy some years ago.

The money came from a pool of funds generated by a small fee on the purchase of a home in the community. The Foundation has been dissolved and the funds dispersed.

The community now has a Charitable Works Committee which hopes to continue working with our club to service the needs of our Coachella Valley.










We understand that scheduling conflicts may arise, but there are still impactful ways to support Soroptimist House of Hope (SHOH) in achieving our ambitious goal of raising \$250,000.

SHOH has applied for the **Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program (BHCIP) grant**, and while we won't know if we've secured the grant until **June 2025**, we have stepped out in faith and secured a property at **22900 Curtin Road**. This bold move increases our chances of being selected for the grant, as it demonstrates our commitment to expanding services for women in need.

Our vision includes:


Transforming our existing property into a 6-bed detox facility.
 Developing a 14-bed women's residential treatment program at the new location.

The BHCIP grant requires a **10% match**, and we hope to avoid pulling equity from our current property. That's where your generosity makes all the difference. Whether through sponsorship, donations, or event participation, your support will help us reach this critical milestone.

If the BHCIP grant is not secured, the funds raised will directly support renovations at the new ADA-compliant, licensed, and conditionally permitted property. Should we receive the grant, your contributions will go towards the 10% match required.

Human Trafficking Awareness

As you might remember from our review of the Soroptimist UpliftHER initiatives, January is Human Trafficking Awareness month. Broadly defined, human trafficking takes place when a person uses force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act from another. It can happen anywhere, and victims can be of any age, race, gender, nationality, or economic background.

While not a pleasant topic to consider, it is one that we need to have knowledge of especially since it does take place right here in the Coachella Valley. In Riverside County massage parlors are a prime location for sex trafficking but there is a way out for victims.

Locally, the Coalition to End Human Trafficking Coachella Valley brings together various agencies, nonprofits and individuals to combat both sex and labor trafficking. The Barbara Sinatra Children's Center is the lead victim service provider in our area. This past January, the Riverside County Anti-Human Trafficking Conference was held at Agua Caliente Resort featuring keynote speaker Rachel Fischer, an author, international consultant and survivor leader.

RECOGNIZING THE WOMEN WHO MAKE A DIFFERENCE



Dr. June McCarroll 1867 - 1954

In the fall of 1917, Dr June Carroll was driving down the road and was run off the road by a truck. She had a choice of a sand dune us the truck. Needless to say, she chose wisely. This is how she started a campaign to have a white line in the center of the road which would designate the two sides of the road.

Before we talk about this, what did she do before? She was born in Kentucky, went to college in Chicago, and went on to get her medical degree at Allopathic Medical College. Being a physician was rare in females at that time. She moved to Nebraska for two years and practiced at the Nebraska State School.

She moved to Indio where the weather was warm and dry because her husband caught tuberculosis. There was a tuberculosis health camp in the tiny town of Indio. Her husband became well, and he became the director of the camp and she was just a housewife when the physician of the camp left. She decided to fill in until a new physician was found. However, her temporary practice became so large with the railroad workers and their families and the ranchers coming to her that her practice became permanent. She was one of the first female physicians in the Coachella Valley and the only physician taking care of tens of thousands Cahuilla natives on the Indian reservation.

Dr. June not only took care of the physical aspects of her patients but also considered the mental state. Tuberculosis patients are quarantined from the rest of the world and had to stay in the camp. To fight boredom in her patients, she applied to Sacramento to have a branch of the state library opened in Indio. This was the first library in the Coachella Valley.

Her practice covered from Palm Springs to the Salton Sea. She spent many an hour on horseback, horse and buggy and later with a car. She often had to do operations in primitive situations on kitchen tables. In 1907, she was designated the first Indian doctor by the Bureau of Indian affairs.

In 1914, her husband died and two years later, she remarried to Frank McCarroll, the local railroad agent. She retired in 1916 when other physicians came to the valley. She then devoted her time to community endeavors. Dr. June became a member of the Indio club of the Riverside's Women's Club.

This is when the event of the truck occurred and the one that made her famous. The truck driver had difficulty determining which side of the road he should be on being that it was dusk and there were no markings. She decided to propose her idea of a white line in the center of the road to the Riverside Board of Supervisors. They listened and did nothing, however, she hand painted herself a stripe on a mile of Hwy 111/86 in Indio. This was the first center stripe in the whole US. It took persistence and five years of her presence at Highway meetings, Chamber of Commerce meetings and at the State Legislation meetings but it actually became state law in 1924.


